## *Radiologic Technology* Distinguished Author Award in Honor of Jean I. Widger

**ASRT congratulates** the 2015 winners of the **Jean I. Widger Distinguished Author Award** and the **Harold Silverman Distinguished Author Award**, honoring the best peer-reviewed articles published in the ASRT journals during the past year.

**Melissa P. Culp**, B.S., R.T.(R)(MR); **James R. Barba**, M.A., R.T.(R); and **Melissa B. Jackowski**, Ed.D., R.T.(R) (M), earned the Widger award for their article “Shield Placement: Effect on Exposure,” which was published in the March/April 2014 issue of *Radiologic Technology*.

Melissa Culp is a faculty member for the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill with an interest in radiology’s contribution to sustainable global health initiatives. She created the research question for “Shield Placement: Effect on Exposure” after her son, Ian, underwent medical imaging at 4 months of age. She believes promoting radiation dose optimization for the vulnerable pediatric population is essential in medical imaging. Melissa is completing a study of instructional design strategies and student attitudes.

Before retiring in January 2014, James Barba was the educational coordinator and PACS administrator for the University of North Carolina Hospitals and clinical assistant professor and lab director for the UNC – Chapel Hill radiologic science program. During more than 40 years in the profession, James saw significant technology changes. However, one thing never changed: the responsibility to hold patient care to the highest standard.



# Distinguished Author

Melissa Jackowski is a clinical assistant professor in the University of North Carolina Division of Radiologic Science. During the past 25 years, she has worked as a radiographer in multiple settings, a radiology administrator, and a community college and university educator. She has a passion for lifelong learning and research and believes R.T.s must research and find answers to questions that affect our profession and patients, change practice based on the findings, and share results through publication.

Their study measured radiation exposure to determine ideal shield placement to protect bone marrow that is not in the primary beam during knee imaging. The study reinforced the notion that shielding should be used in conjunction with collimation to reduce exposure as much as possible. Specifically, they determined shielding on the surface of the patient facing the primary beam results in the greatest reduction in exposure outside of collimation. According to the authors, when imaging the knee, especially in children, it is critical to shield as much long bone and, therefore, red marrow, as possible.



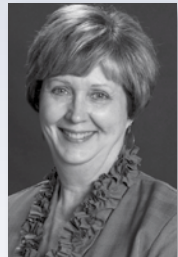
## *Radiation Therapist* Distinguished Author Award in Honor of Harold Silverman

**Patricia Sledge Brewer, M.P.A., R.T.(R)(T); Terrence J. Ravine, Ph.D., M.T.; and Sarah E. Bru, M.S., M.T.**, earned the Silverman award for their article "Risk of Patient Infection From Heating Appliances Used to Produce Thermoplastic Immobilization Devices," which was published in the Fall 2014 issue of *Radiation Therapist*.

Patricia Sledge Brewer is the radiation therapy program director for the University of South Alabama in Mobile. She earned her master's degree in public administration and has more than 30 years of radiation therapist experience serving in staff, educational and administrative roles. When a clinical supervisor posed questions about water bath maintenance, she saw an opportunity to conduct research that had practical applications for radiation therapy facilities. She piqued Terrence Ravine's curiosity by inquiring about the microbial contamination potential of these heating devices.

For Terry Ravine, who has a degree in experimental pathology, it was a question that deserved an answer. His experience includes more than 20 years working in or directing clinical laboratory facilities in the public and private sectors, specifically involving clinical microbiology and infection control. He also has taught anatomy and physiology at the University of South Alabama for more than 10 years.

Sarah Bru has degrees in medical technology and instructional design, as well as 21 years of experience in the clinical laboratory, including work in microbiology, clinical chemistry, instruction and supervision. Before retiring from the University

of South Alabama, where she taught anatomy and physiology, Sarah was responsible for her department's quality assurance practices, including proper maintenance of equipment.

Their study assessed whether appliances used to heat water for fabricating immobilization devices carry micro-organisms that present risk of disease transmission. Forty-two percent of surfaces tested positive for potentially harmful bacteria, including those associated with common skin microbial flora, which suggested that facility staff handled the appliances without gloves or clean hands.

The researchers also found that clear or hazy water did not necessarily indicate the absence or presence of bacteria, and that use, maintenance and cleaning procedures varied widely between facilities and often were inadequate. The findings remind radiation therapists that they cannot overlook simple, daily processes such as proper hand hygiene and basic equipment maintenance.

Having a radiation therapist and two clinical laboratorians on the research team brought multiple perspectives to the study. The researchers hope their results and recommendations prompt serious discussions that ultimately lead to improved patient care and safety.

## 2015 ASRT Fellow

Anne C. Brittain, Ph.D., R.T.(R)(M)(QM), CPHQ

**Anne Brittain** was born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri. After graduating from Lutheran High School North, she attended the University of Missouri at Columbia. Anne graduated from UMC with a bachelor's degree in allied health sciences – radiography and was registered with the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists in July 1990.

Anne began her radiography career as a staff technologist, first at Allen Memorial Hospital in Waterloo, Iowa, and then at Missouri Baptist Medical Center in St. Louis as a staff technologist and mammographer. ## 2015 ASRT Fellow

**Sandra E. Hayden, M.A., R.T.(T)**

Although **Sandra Hayden's** first job after graduating from high school in suburban Detroit was as a secretary for an accounting firm, she always knew she wanted to work in health care. She soon found a position at a clinical laboratory and then obtained training and certification from the Michigan Department of Mental Health to work with the mentally ill. She later was accepted into the Minority Biomedical Research Support Program in the Department of Psychology at Wayne State University in Detroit.

Knowing her interest in physics, biology and human interaction, a counselor suggested that Sandra consider radiation therapy as a career. Following a site visit to Harper Hospital's Radiation Oncology Department in Detroit, Sandra knew radiation therapy was her calling.

After graduating from Wayne State with two bachelor's degrees – one in psychology and one in radiation therapy – Sandra accepted a position at Grace Hospital in Detroit. She worked on several research projects there, including one that investigated the relationship between circadian rhythms and cancer. She also researched the necessity of competency validation and developed criteria and formats for radiation therapy departments across the country. Quickly rising through the ranks, Sandra became the chief radiation therapist at Grace Hospital and also served as a clinical education supervisor and instructor at Wayne State.

In 1997 Sandra was promoted to system-wide supervisor for the Detroit Medical Center/Karmanos Cancer Institute, overseeing 46 radiation therapists at five locations. She also served in many roles for the Michigan Society of Radiologic Technologists, becoming the first radiation therapist to serve as MSRT president.

In the late 1990s Sandra moved into academia as a staff member of the radiation therapy program at Baker College in Flint, Michigan. She traveled statewide to evaluate students' learning and competency. At the same time,

she worked at an HMO to gain an insight into managed care and accepted a position as chief radiation therapist/technical specialist.

In 2000 Sandra started volunteering for the profession on a national level and was hired as the chief therapist/technical specialist at Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn, Michigan. In 2003 she served in the ASRT House as an affiliate delegate from Michigan, and in 2004 she graduated from the ASRT Leadership Academy.

In 2006 Sandra accepted the position of administrative director of Radiation Therapy Services at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center. She currently oversees more than 125 radiation therapists at four locations in Houston and two in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and she oversees radiation therapy at MD Anderson facilities in Arizona, Florida, New Jersey and internationally.

Sandra's ASRT involvement includes serving as a Radiation Therapy Chapter delegate; chairman of the Radiation Therapy Chapter Steering Committee; member of the Commission; and Board positions as vice speaker and speaker of the House, vice president and president-elect. On behalf of the ASRT, Sandra testified before the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Energy and Commerce in February 2010 about the importance of educational and certification standards for radiologic technologists and radiation therapists. She also presented radiation therapy equipment user training for the FDA on behalf of the ASRT.

Sandra served on the board of the Texas Society of Radiologic Technologists as first vice president and was inducted in the TSRT Professional Hall of Fame due to her dedication to the profession. Sandra received her master's degree in health care administration from Ashford University in 2011.

Quality patient care has always been the focus of Sandra's work. She contributed to the American Society for Radiation Oncology's white paper "Safety is No Accident: A Framework for Quality Radiation Oncology and Care," and she is a member of the ASTRO Accreditation workgroup. She also worked on several patient safety projects for the American Association of Physicists in Medicine.

Sandra and her daughter Viandra, a radiation therapy student, reside in Houston. They both love family, radiation therapy, music, dancing and traveling.

## 2015 ASRT Fellow

**Donita L. Shipman, R.T.(R)(M)(QM)**

**Donita Shipman** was born and raised in Drexel, Missouri. Immediately after graduating from Drexel High School she enrolled in the Research Medical Center School of Radiologic Technology in Kansas City, Missouri. She graduated on July 1, 1982, took the ARRT certification exam on July 13 and started working at Bothwell Hospital in Sedalia, Missouri, on July 31.

Bothwell was a small rural hospital at the time, and Donita had the opportunity to learn much more than she would have at a large urban hospital. Starting as a diagnostic radiographer, she also learned how to perform sonography and vascular procedures. She went on to become certified in mammography and quality management. Both she and the hospital have grown, and today Donita is imaging informatics coordinator at Bothwell Regional Medical Center.

In 1991 Donita attended the Missouri Society of Radiologic Technologists annual conference for the first time. The next year she was elected as president of the 3rd District and subsequently as District 3 representative to the MSRT board of directors. In 1993 she was elected secretary of the MSRT and the same year she received an award for membership recruitment.

In 1994 Donita organized a lobbying day in the Missouri Senate that coincided with debate of a bill to license radiologic technologists. In short order she assumed the duties of legislative activities chairman. In 1995 Donita was elected vice president of the MSRT and, due to a sudden vacancy, she found herself serving in the office of president. While completing her presidency she was elected president-elect and then served a second term as president. Throughout this time she continued as legislative chairman, receiving the MSRT Award of Excellence. She was subsequently elected as treasurer and in 2002 accepted the newly created position of executive treasurer and membership chairman, a position she has held for 15 years. Donita has held every elected office in the MSRT and has either chaired or been a member of almost every MSRT committee.

On the national level, Donita has served in the ASRT House of Delegates many times, including terms as Missouri affiliate delegate, Radiography Chapter delegate, Mammography Chapter delegate and Quality Management Chapter delegate. She attended numerous R.T. in D.C. legislative events in Washington, D.C.

A graduate of the ASRT Leadership Academy in 2000, Donita has a long history of service to the ASRT. She has been a member of the Committee on R.T. ## Eileen M. Maloney, M.Ed., R.T.(R)(M), FASRT

**Eileen Maloney** graduated from high school in northern New Jersey with plans to attend college and major in pre-medicine. However, financial circumstances at the time would not allow her dream to become a reality. Because she played sports in high school, she had received x-ray exams from time to time and began thinking about radiologic technology as a possible career. As fate would have it, one of her neighbors knew the director of the radiography program at what was then St. Joseph's Hospital School of X-Ray Technology in Paterson, New Jersey. Although

she had a connection, the program was already filled. However, when one of the selected students was drafted into the Army, Eileen was chosen to take his place. Thus, in the fall of 1965, Eileen began her journey into the radiography profession.

After graduating from radiography school, Eileen's education continued when, in 1972, she received a grant from the Kellogg Foundation to attend the State University of New York at Buffalo. In 1976 she graduated from SUNY with a bachelor of science degree in health education and evaluation and, in 1987, she earned her master's degree in education from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey.

Throughout her career Eileen has been recognized for her achievement. She received the Outstanding Student Achievement award when she graduated from St. Joseph's and the Outstanding Student Teacher award while attending SUNY at Buffalo. In 1997 she was honored with the Jaime Escalante Award for outstanding teaching from the American Association of Higher Education.

Eileen has been an ASRT member for over 41 years, and her dedication to the profession has been well documented. Eileen was elevated to ASRT Fellow in 1990. She has served on many ASRT committees throughout the years, including the Educational Consensus Conferences in 1995 that helped to determine the future of the profession. She also was an affiliate delegate in the first seating of the House, as well as serving on several committees related to radiography education. She served as the chairman of the Reference Committee on Education. During her tenure on the Board of Directors, which included holding the offices of president and chairman of the Board, Eileen was most proud of the development of the radiologist assistant profession as well the introduction of the ASRT Leadership Academy for Educators.

On a local level, Eileen has been a member of the New Jersey Society of Radiologic Technologists since 1978 and served as its president. In 1997 she was awarded Life Membership in the NJSRT. For the past 25 years she has been a member of the Radiologic Technology Board of Examiners of New Jersey, the licensing board, and also served on the New Jersey Commission on Radiation Protection.

Throughout the years Eileen has been a frequent speaker on the state, national and international levels. During her ASRT presidential year, she spoke in Queensland, Australia, on the role expansion of the radiologic technologist in the United States. Following a conversation with one of her students from China, the student's uncle, who was a radiologist in China and the president of the Chinese Medical Association's Shanghai branch, invited Eileen to speak to members of the association in 1990 about management of radiology departments in the United States.

Back home in Fair Lawn, New Jersey, Eileen enjoys spending time with her family and friends and rooting for her favorite sports teams. Because she is anticipating retirement in the coming year, she says that being honored with Life Membership in the ASRT is the perfect ending for the career that has been so good to her.

## William H. May, M.Ed., R.T.(R), FASRT

**Bill May** joined ASRT as a second-year radiography student in 1971 and has maintained his membership for 44 continuous years. Bill worked as a staff technologist following graduation and has served as an educator and program director for the past 42 years. Many of his former students have served in a variety of positions in numerous state affiliates and as delegates in the ASRT House.

Bill's involvement with professional organizations began while he was still a radiography student.

During the second year of his educational program, he became secretary-treasurer of the Indiana Society of Radiologic Technologists, District 1. He later became the second and first vice president, president-elect and president of the ISRT. During that time he also served as a lobbyist for the ISRT and was a key figure in getting a strong licensure bill passed and enacted in Indiana. He was awarded Life Membership in ISRT.

In 1981 Bill joined the Mississippi Society of Radiologic Technologists, eventually holding numerous committee positions and lobbying for licensure. When a licensure bill was eventually enacted, Bill was appointed as a charter member to the Mississippi Board of Health, Radiation Advisory Council. He served on the MSRT board of directors for 12 years and was awarded Life Membership and named Technologist of the Year.

Bill moved to Tennessee in 2006 and joined the Tennessee Society of Radiologic Technologists, becoming president-elect that year and going on to serve as a member of the board of directors for eight years.

Bill was the ASRT appointee to the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology for two terms, serving two years as chairman. During his tenure, Bill and two other ASRT appointees obtained majority representation of technologists on the JRCERT board. He then was reappointed to an unprecedented third term. He has been a JRCERT site visitor since 1976 and currently serves as a team chairman. Bill also led the battle for majority representation of radiologic technologists on the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists board of trustees.

# Life Member

The ASRT has benefited from Bill's contributions. He has served on over 14 ASRT committees, task forces and work groups, including the group that worked on the last three revisions of the ASRT Radiography Curriculum. Beginning at age 26, Bill was elected to serve on the ASRT Board of Directors for eight years as Region VI director, vice president and president. He was one of the first national Education Chapter delegates elected. He served 12 years as a Mississippi affiliate delegate, one year as the Tennessee delegate, six years as Education Chapter delegate, and as a member and chairman of the Commission. He has attended over 40 ASRT annual meetings and served as a mentor to numerous student members attending the ASRT annual meetings.

In 1984 Bill was the last ASRT president to preside over the annual meeting. During that meeting, the ASRT Board of Directors proposed bylaws to create the ASRT House of Delegates. Bill handled 53 amendments to amend the bylaws.

Also in 1984 he led the formation of the ASRT Educational Foundation. He was the first acting chairman, vice president and president during his six years on the Foundation board. In the same year he also led the move of the ASRT office from its rental property in Chicago to its current location in Albuquerque, with his signature on the original mortgage. Bill was elevated to ASRT Fellow in 2006.

Not known for his passive support, Bill is passionate about his beliefs and quick to take an unofficial leadership role in the House. He has actively supported the associate degree as the entry-level standard into the profession, professional ethics, licensure, advanced degrees for program directors and clinical coordinators, and numerous other issues that make ASRT a stronger organization. Bill views his membership in ASRT as a personal and professional responsibility. Bill is not just a part of the ASRT; the ASRT is a part of who Bill is as a person.
