The Arroyo Grande City Council recently approved a resolution to send a letter to Governor Jerry Brown in support of SB 659 that proposes postponing the deadline date from Feb. 1 to April 15.

In part the letter states, "Temporarily postponing this February deadline will allow time for the Legislature and governor to develop a new job creation and neighborhood renewal program, and to develop a solution that ensures that schools and the state budget receive the funding intended by the Legislature when they passed the redevelopment budget legislation last year. Pooper Scooper Ordinance In AG

Dog may be considered man's best friend, but dog waste could create problems in the City of Arroyo Grande's waterways. Pet owners who fail to scoop the poop may be cited following an ordinance under consideration by the City Council.

The ordinance is part of the city's Storm Water Management Plan (SWMP) adopted in 2009 and approved by the Central Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board.

The goals of the five-year plan are to reduce the volume of storm water runoff into area creeks and streams and eliminate the discharge of pollutants to the city's storm water collection system.

Dogs are not the only animals taking the heat. The ordinance also makes it a violation to feed animals, including cats and birds, or leave food of any kind within 100 feet of the city's creeks, retention basins or other body of water unless it is in a trashcan.


"It's quite an honor," said the 42-year-old longtime Five Cities resident. "I wasn't expecting it at all."


