one of the Magic Kingdom’s most beloved attractions, Dumbo the Flying Elephant, which will be completely re-imagined. Guests will be invited to step into the big top and join the circus before their magical flight over Fantasyland.

Disney World will also begin heavy construction on a huge revamp of Fantasyland. They are constructing individual areas where guests can interact with some of the best-known princesses and other Disney movie characters. Children will be able to dance with Cinderella, celebrate Aurora’s birthday with the Good Fairies, or play a role with Belle in the library of the Beast’s castle. The Beast’s castle will also include a three-room themed restaurant. Fans of Disney’s animated classic “The Little Mermaid” will journey under the sea to meet Ariel and her friends on an exciting new musical adventure.

Downtown Update

Downtown Disney has seen two upgrades in the end of 2010 that are worth seeing this year. Auditorium One at the Pleasure Island’s 24 AMC Theater has been upgraded into the first Enhanced Theater Experience (ETX) in the U.S. ETX theaters offer a 20 percent larger screen that goes

from floor to ceiling, 3D technology, digital projection and 12-channel audio. Also, Downtown Disney has added two new stores: D Street, an apparel store featuring urban inspired apparel and Ridemakerz, which sells customized radio-controlled vehicles.

Make a Splash

SeaWorld will launch a new killer-whale show in spring 2011. The as-yet-unnamed Shamu show, according to the Orlando Sentinel, will replace the five-year-old “Believe” as the signature attraction. SeaWorld’s Aquatica water park opened a new water slide in late 2010 called Omaka Rocka. Spring 2011 is a perfect time to experience this new water slide that is a high-speed tube with near vertical thrills, which gives riders a sense of weightlessness.

Thrill Seeker

Orlando Thrill Park, a brand new theme park planned along I-Drive is expected to get approval to start construction in 2011. Plans for the 77-acre park call for an assortment of towering thrill rides and every variety of roller coaster—including motorbike and fourth dimension coasters—with room set aside for future development.
