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## **History**

In 1923, the Morganton Public Library was first established in a room over a downtown business. One can only imagine how Will Davis felt opening the library door and checking out the very first book. In 2012, the doors of the Burke County Public Library will be opened more than 110,000 times.

For most of its existence the Burke County Public Library was a private, nonprofit corporation chartered to provide library service to the citizens of Burke County and governed by a board of trustees. In 1982, libraries in Morganton and Valdese merged to form the Burke County Public Library. The Burke County Commission established the C.B. Hildebrand Public Library as the county's newest public library in 1997. Governance changed in 2002 as the library became a department of Burke County government and relinquished its non-profit status for oversight by the Burke County Commission.



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## **Valdese Public Library**

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#### Mission

The Valdese Public Library opened in 1943 in a room at the old Post Office in downtown Valdese. At that moment, in the midst of the second World War, the community of Valdese was looking towards the future, to a time of renewed prosperity and peace much as the original Waldensian pioneers did when they settled in Burke County in 1893.

As it approaches its 70th anniversary, the mission of the Valdese Public Library to develop readers, community, and cultural awareness has never been more relevant. The ability of the library to serve a diverse population hinges not only on having an extensive collection of materials but just as importantly on providing a wide variety of programs.

In 2001, the library, with funds donated by the Rostan Family Foundation, purchased the house adjacent to the library from Catherine R. Cole. The property, deeded to Burke County and the Town of Valdese, was to "be used for the purpose of providing and maintaining a public library."

With the increase in the demand for programs, the library is now seeking to renovate the house and its grounds into a multipurpose indoor and outdoor programming and activity space. The house would be modified to consist of one large open room with a vaulted ceiling of approximately 1,000 square feet. This space would provide an area for storytimes, crafts, computer classes, book discussions, films, workshops, and other community gatherings. An outdoor programming area would be constructed at the rear of the house with a covered stage and tiered seating for 120 people. This area would be used for concerts, theatre performances, movies, storytelling, lectures, and demonstrations.
