Sokol has 'the teaching gene'

John Sokol was "born with the teaching gene" as he would like to say, and fortunately for Gogebic Community College, he is now a full-time mathematics instructor here.

However, he didn't start off as an instructor. Right out of college, Sokol, 36, applied to be a math tutor for the TRiO program and was accepted. Sokol then became a coordinator for TRiO and taught adjunct math classes on the side. When longtime mathematics instructor Deb Pletcher retired in the spring of 2011, Sokol was first choice as the newest math instructor.

Currently, Sokol teaches college alge-

bra, introductory algebra, intermediate algebra, and mathematics for elementary education teachers.

The best part is, he loves it.

When asked why he loves teaching Sokol's response was, "I have a niche for teaching others and for relating to the math problems they have."

Then, when asked the question many people wonder, why he loves math, Sokol replied, "I'm good at math and it has always come easy for me. When you thoroughly understand a discipline, you've been through all of the misconception that can arise."

Being able to relate to the struggles students face with math, Sokol hasn't found anyone he couldn't teach. This is partially due to his style of teaching. Sokol tries to make his math classes as entertaining, relevant, and fun as possible while still teaching core concepts. He accredits this skill to his biggest influence, Dr. Peggy House from Northern Michigan University, who opened his eyes to that style of teaching math-

ematics. He also recognizes his wife as an influence as he says, "I wouldn't be here without the love and support of my wonderful wife, Jerri."

Outside of teaching, Sokol appreciates learning about historic mathematicians. One mathematician he likes to discuss is Karl Gauss or known by Sokol as "Baby Gauss." A story of Gauss's that fascinated Sokol is when Gauss was asked by his teacher in grade school to add all the numbers from one to 100 and it took only eight seconds.

Sokol's all-time favorite mathematician is Leonhard Euler, who made important discoveries in calculus, which is Sokol's favorite math subject. "Calculus," as Sokol explains it, "is fascinating because it's applicable to real life."

While many people may oppose the belief that calculus is best, Sokol maintains that math is found everywhere and everyone should learn calculus. Overall, this job couldn't be any better for Sokol; he gets to do what he loves and is good at it. As Sokol would put it, "not every-

one can teach," but lucky enough for GCC he can, especially math.

- ½ teaspoon dried basil

Review: The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo

One of the joys of being back in my Canadian home is my return to the movie theatre. For me it is a weekly event.

In fact, I have seen seven of the nine nominated films for the Oscar's Best Picture Award. One movie that didn't make the Best Picture nominations but

is definitely worth your movie viewing dollars is The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo. The film is based on the international best seller of the same name. The book was written by Swedish author, Stieg Larsson, and takes place in Stockholm

This pop culture phenomenon tells the story of Mikael Blomkvist (played by Daniel Craig), an investigative journalist, who is hired by wealthy, Henrik Vanger (played by Christopher Plummer) to investigate the disappearance of his niece, a mystery that has remained unsolved for decades. Vanger lures Blomkvist to the family's island by promising him a year's wages and revenge on the man who ruined Blomkvist's career. Blomkvist is able to interview the estranged and infamous

Vanger family, under the ruse of writing Vanger's memoirs. The investigation turns up all the family's dirty secrets and puts Blomkvist in life threatening circumstances.

Lisabeth Salander is the other protagonist in the story. Salander (played exceptionally well by new comer Rooney Mara) is an intellectual punk misfit who is covered in tattoos and piercings. She is a private investigator who gets the job done by using any means possible; computer hacking is not outside her area of expertise. The two main characters join forces as they lead the audience through a thrilling ride of suspense, murder, and action.

I enjoyed the movie with all its twists and turns. Unfortunately, it follows the book so closely that for me there was no element of surprise. Director David Fincher made excellent choices for his characters. Mara was exceptionally on the mark, as she appeared just as disturbing yet intelligent and likeable as the character Larsson created. The movie kept me interested for the whole 158 minutes.

I must warn potential viewers that there is a rape and revenge scene that had some of the patrons exiting the theatre. I believe the movie is fast-moving and riveting; especially if you have not read the book.

The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo is definitely a movie to see if you like thrillers or are a fan of Stieg Larsson and his Millennium Series. I give it a 3.5/5.
