**Historical thinking** - a set of critical literacy skills for evaluating and analyzing primary source documents to construct a meaningful account of the past.

Reading a photograph deals with Historical Analysis and Interpretation

# Photograph as a primary source visual document

### Strengths:

- Captures a moment in time in a visual medium
- Quickly and concisely informs about people, places, objects, and events
- Provides information that is difficult to convey through written formats (fashion, decor, art, etc.)
- Sometimes records details of everyday life of people that are not captured in written records
- Can evoke memories and/or emotions in the viewer

# Photograph as a primary source visual document

### Weaknesses:

- People, place, date, and the name of the photographer are often not identified
- May reflect the bias or perspective of the photographer
- Photographs must be studied in conjunction with other evidence. Without context, a photo may be interesting but not informative.
- Photographs are taken for different purposes.
   Not all photographs were taken with documentary intent and some are heavily manipulated
- Many decades of photographs are in black-and-white or the color has faded and is no longer accurate

# Working through the process... Grab a few sheets of paper for writing!

How do I know this is true?

Avoid making assumptions, rather see what can be inferred.

For example, how do you know that a group of people is a family or even related?

Why was this photo taken?

Check any bias and frequently ask why?

For example, what determines the difference between successful homesteaders or struggling pioneers?

Remember! Asking open-ended questions with no right or wrong answers generally leads to more questions - FUN!

## Looking for visual elements and subject matter

**PEOPLE** - Identify the people, one or a group, gender, age, relationship to each other. What are they wearing? Do they convey emotion?

PHOTOGRAPHER/STUDIO - Is one indicated?

**TIME** - What time of day is it? What season, year, period, or century?

**ACTIVITIES & EVENTS** - What are the people doing, what event is taking place?

**OBJECTS/ANIMALS/PLANTS** - Where can flora/fauna be found?

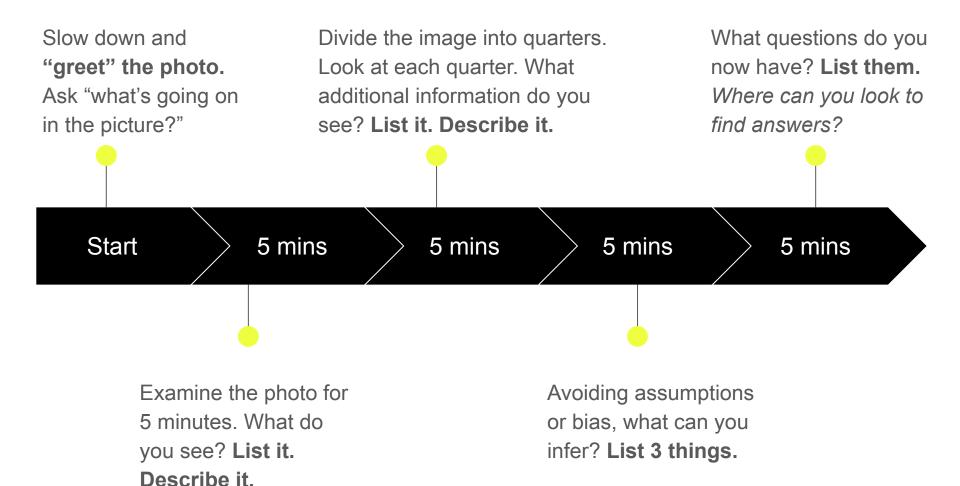
**PLACE -** Are there recognizable landmarks or architecture? Is it rural or urban, indoor/outdoor?

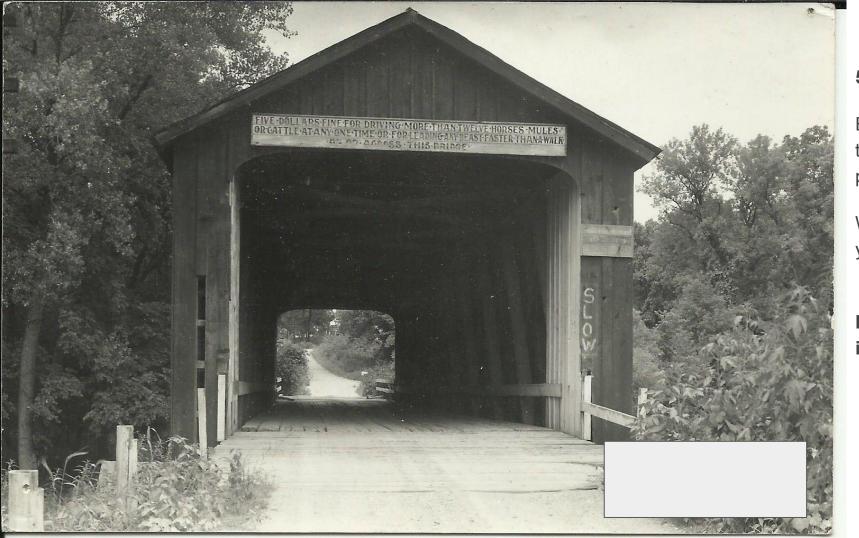
**PHOTO TITLE/CAPTION** - Is one indicated?

In family portraiture, do you recognize:

- Family heirlooms?
- Furniture?
- Location?
- Family members?
  - Use a process of elimination, along with genealogy, to determine which family member it is or is not

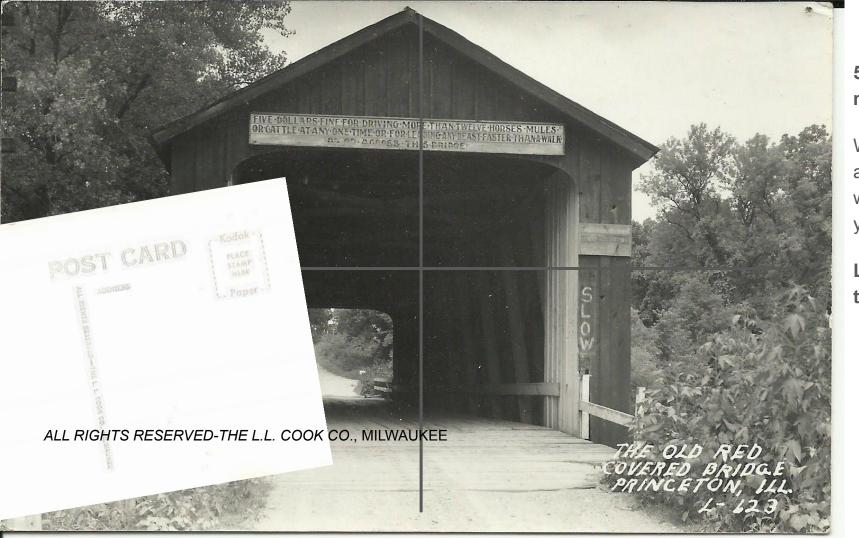

# Finding and visiting in person



### BURISAU COUNTY'S RED COVERED ERIDGE BUILT IN 1865

THIS BRIDGE WAS PRESENTED UNDER THE SUPERVISION BUREAU COUNTY AT A RESTING BELD IN PRINCETON LATRONS OF LATRONS ON LARCE THE ROSE, THE COUNTY FOR WAS CONFOSED UP 2. N. THOMSON AND C. M. ## Further resources and homework

- Use genealogical research to help you infer and deduce within your own collection of family photographs
- Research hair and clothing styles to recognize a time period
- Research the methods used by Historic Preservationists regarding architecture and landscapes
- Research Visual Thinking Strategies
   (VTS) that uses art to facilitate visual
   literacy skills by asking three basic
   questions: What is going on in this
   picture? What do you see that makes you
   say that? What more can you find?

- Research visual vocabulary of art, also used within photographs (ie: balance, composition, focus, and perspective)
- Research the history and technological advances in the history of photography
- Research the types of photographs to better determine a date range

## Identifying photograph type and dating

Daguerreotypes (1839-1860) can be identified by a silver mirror finish where the image can be seen or not seen depending on reflection.

Ambrotypes (1850s-1860s) are a positive on glass with black background added in order to contrast.

Tintypes (1850s-Early 1900s) more properly known as ferrotypes, are a positive on iron.

Albumen prints (1850-1895) Are two layer photographs on paper that may be glossy with purplish brown to chocolate brown colors; 80% of 19th century photographs on paper are of this type.

Salted paper prints (1839-1860s) are single layer prints comprised of uncoated paper with a silver image deposited in the fibers; paper fibers will be clearly visible.

Platinum prints (1873 -1930s) are single layer prints comprised of platinum or palladium embedded in uncoated fibers; the surface is matte with no gloss, fading, or silvering

Cyanotype prints (1872-1950s) are characteristically blue in tone, typically with poor contrast and sharpness.

Gelatin silver prints (1874-present) comprise the bulk of 20th century black and white images and are often gold toned, shifting the image to red-violet or dark black-violet.

# Tips for care and handling of photographs

When writing on the reverse side of photos, use a soft graphite pencil (6B)

Use nitrile gloves when handling photographs and do not touch photos on the face of the image

Handle photos mounted on board with both hands and do not pick up by the corners

Do not use mending tape, rubber bands, paper clips, or staples to attach or repair photos

Do not attempt to remove an image mounted on board as it may destroy the photo

NEVER remove encased photographs such as daguerreotypes, ambrotypes or tintypes from their protective cases or attempt to clean them
