- The Great Barrier Reef is the largest reef and living structure in the world.
- It is located off of Queensland, Australia in the Pacific Ocean.
- The Reef is over 1,600 miles (2600 km) in length.
- The Reef was formed over millions of years from thousands of individual animals called coral polyps - so it is alive!
- Pryozoans (tiny organisms) and algae are what hold it all together.
- It is the only living thing on Earth visible from space.
- The Great Barrier Reef is home to over 1,500 different types of fish.
- There are 215 different types of birds living around the Great Barrier Reef
- 5,000 types of mollusks such as octopus, cuttlefish and squid live there too.





Australia Recipe

Vegemite is a paste made out of leftover brewer's yeast that is a popular spread for sandwiches. A lamington is a yummy dessert with sponge cake covered with chocolate icing and shredded coconut. Lamingtons were invented in the 1800s as a way to use stale sponge cake.

ingredients:

Sponge cake (1-2 days old)

2 cups (475ml) powdered sugar

4 tablespoons (60ml)

cocoa powder 1 stick butter

1 teaspoon (5 ml) vanilla

2 cups (475 ml) finely

shredded coconut

directions:

Melt butter in microwave (get an adult to help), then add vanilla, sugar and cocoa and stir together. Cut sponge cake into small squares. Next pour the coconut into a bowl. Take one piece of sponge cake at a time and dip in the chocolate icing, then roll in the shredded coconut.

- The world's oldest fossil, which is about 3 billion years old, was found in Australia.
- A desert area known as the 'outback' covers much of the land.
- Ayers Rock, in the outback, is the biggest sandstone rock in the world! It is officially known as Uluru.
- The Aborigines (the native people of Australia), have been there for 60,000 years and invented the boomerang.
- Australia is home to unique animals including the koala, kangaroo, emu, kookaburra and platypus.
- Australia has over 750 different reptile species, more than any other country in the world.
- The Australian Alps receive more snowfall than Switzerland.
- The Sydney Opera House is the most famous performing arts location in the world. It is shaped like the sails of a boat.





- Noalas are **native** to Australia.
- They are marsupials, not bears, and are related to kangaroos and wombats.
- The female has a pouch where their tiny baby (joey) develops until they are 7 months old.
- Fossils of koalas found in Australia have been dated as far back as 20 million years.
- Eucalyptus leaves are almost all that koalas eat.
- They have sharp claws which help them climb trees.
- Their fingerprints are similar to human fingerprints.
- O Koalas have large noses that are colored pink or black.





- Akubra is an Aboriginal (native Australian) word for a head covering.
- The Akubra is an outback bush hat made from rabbit fur felt that has a wide brim.
- Outback hats protect the farmers, cowboys and other workers from the sun, heat, rain or snow.
- They are also used to hold eggs or mushrooms, to fan fires, and are even used to give water to dogs.
- Akubra hats sometimes have oorks hanging from the brim to keep away the flies.
- The "Driza-Bone" is the traditional Australian cowboy's oilskin riding coat.
- The coat was made for Australian cowboys to protect them from the rain.
- Driza-Bone coats were also worn by the men who built the railways, roads and highways of Australia.





Australia's currency is the Australian dollar which comes in denominations of 5, 10, 20, 50 and 100 notes. Coins come in 5, 10, 20 and 50 cent pieces and one and two dollar denominations.

- The symbol for the Australian dollar is A.
- O The Australian dollar was introduced in **1966**, replacing the Australian pound.
- Australia was the first country to replace their paper bills, or notes, with **plastio** ones. These bills are harder to **counterfeit** (copy) and last four times as long as paper notes.
- Australian bills have pictures of **famous** Australians.
- Australian coins feature Queen Elizabeth II on the front and Australian symbols on the back.
- The A\$1 coin has five kangaroos on the back.
