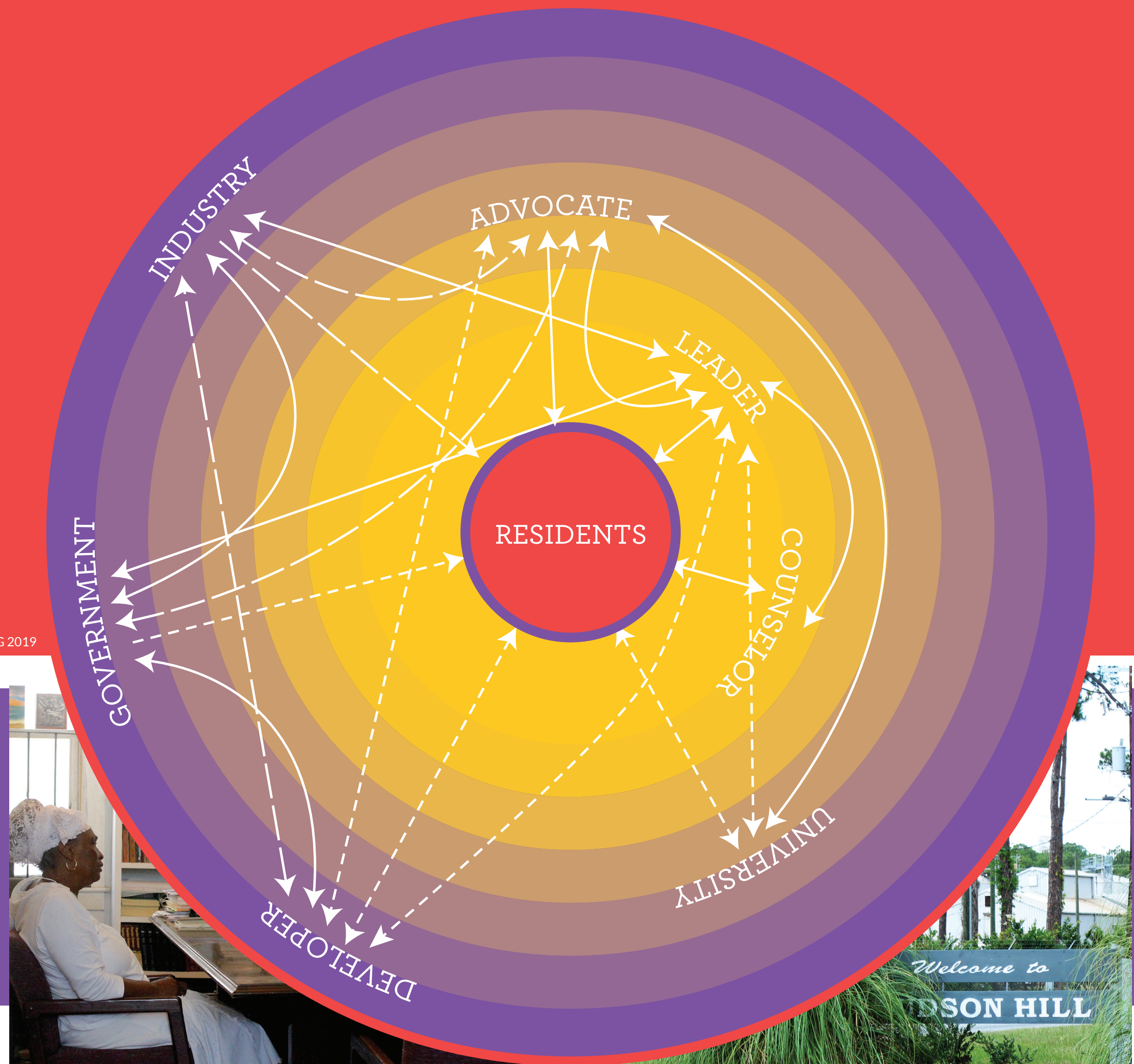

TABLE TALK

is a multi-stakeholder experience, which uses roleplay interaction, collaborative problem solving and generative communication, to build effective communication channels both internally and externally. It intends to help align communities and prepare participants to address complex community problems.



A **UNIFYING THEME** across all our research, Hudson Hill demands a seat at the table. They want to be involved in decision making and planning that affects their community and to be informed on direct and indirect impacts on their neighborhood. Often discounted because of their vernacular, they defy negative characterizations by actively working to stay informed and involved. In response to slow movement on environmental justice issues and to help carry forward the goals and outcomes of the Near-Port Pilot Program, Hudson Hill is forming its own internal environmental justice group. It is still in the very early organizing stages.



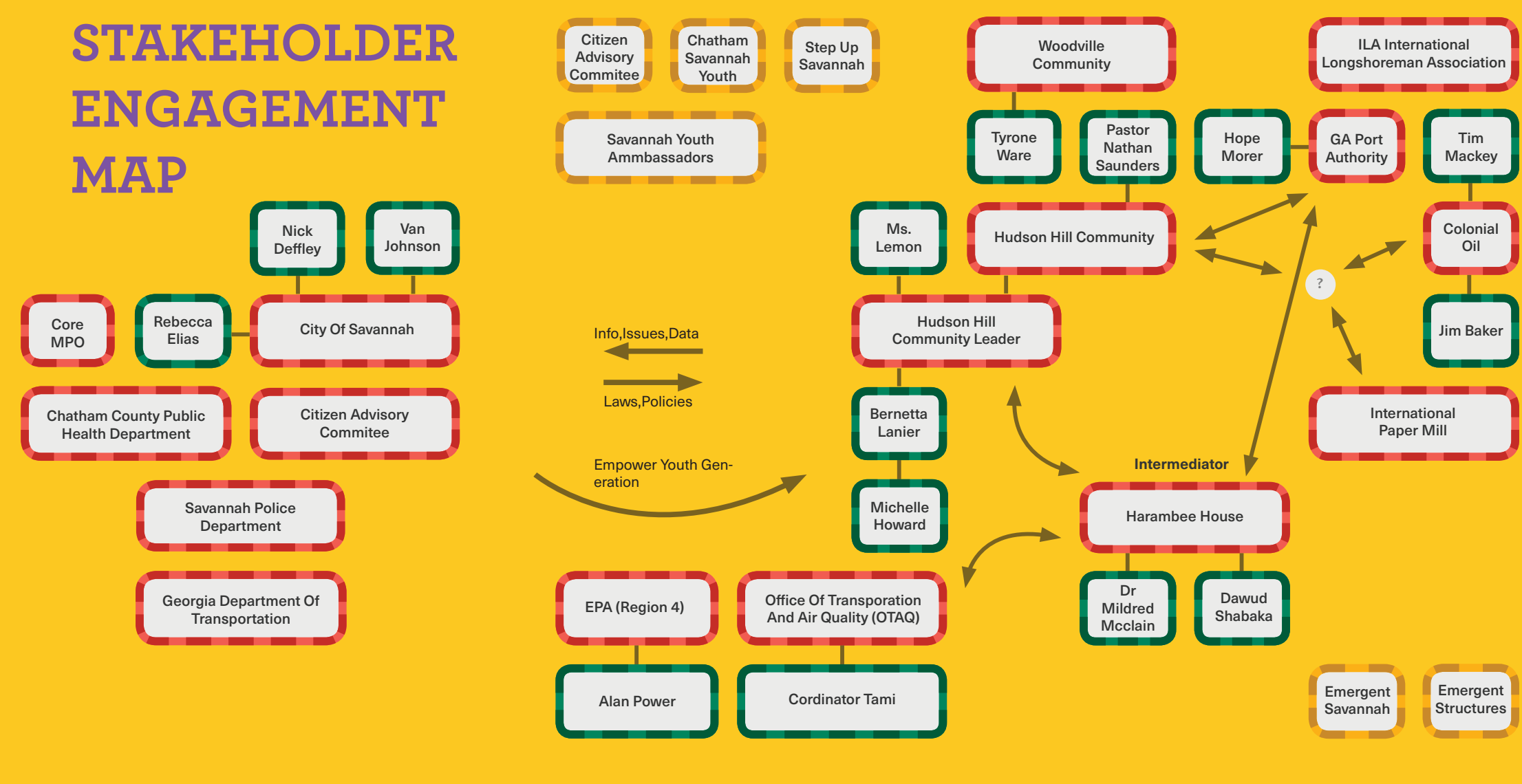
HARAMBEE HOUSE

has labored to secure multiple EPA grants for Hudson Hill over the past fifteen years to redress the impacts of these industries on Hudson Hill. They applied for the Near-Port Pilot Program in an effort to bring all parties to the table with Hudson Hill, encourage accountability, and work through Hudson Hill's pain points related to environmental justice.

HUDSON HILL

sits at the nexus of the Savannah Ocean Port, freeways, railways, and industrial plants. While the Georgia Port Authority and other surrounding industries believe they are being good neighbors by attending neighborhood meetings and through small charitable donations to Hudson Hill, residents want to be in a truly equitable partnership with them.

When to play this game?

1. A gathering of community members
2. Community meetings
3. Business roundtables

Who is it for?

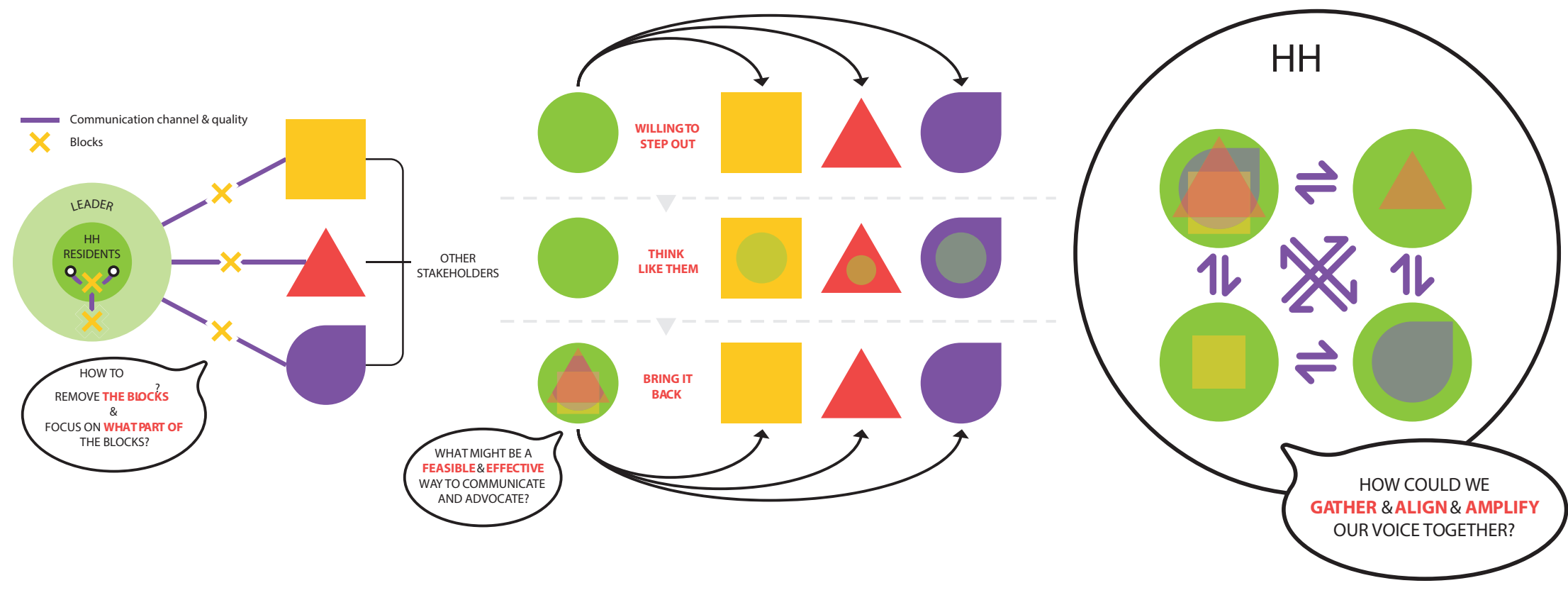
1. Community members
2. Community leaders - to play with stakeholders /potential stakeholders like government, NGO's, industry, other communities, etc.

What will you need?

1. A group of 7-8 people
2. A facilitator
3. An assistant facilitator
4. And 30 mins to spare!

How is it played?

1. Assign each player a role
2. Get players acquainted with their role
3. Have each player introduce their role to their new team
4. Have the team pick a collective issue
5. Have the team set a goal for the issue
6. Get started on addressing the goal
7. Incorporate the new information provided by the disruption cards
8. Use the motion cards to keep the conversation going
9. Assess your plan of action on the final buzzer
10. Reflect on how your conversation and collaborative experience went
